NAOTO OTOMO

CONDUCTOR

Honorary Guest Conductor, Tokyo Symphony Orchestra Conductor Laureate, Kyoto Symphony Orchestra Music Director, Ryukyu Symphony Orchestra Artistic Director, Takasaki City Theatre Music Adviser, Seto Philharmonic Orchestra

Since his debut with the NHK Symphony Orchestra at the age of 22, Otomo has been invited regularly to conduct all the major orchestras both based in Tokyo and all over Japan.

Outside his country, Otomo led the Tokyo Symphony Orchestra on their overseas tours and has appeared repeatedly with the Royal Stockholm Philharmonic Orchestra, Orchestre national de Lorraine. He also led the Philharmonia Orchestra on its tour to Japan. Otomo has premiered numerous new works, conducting especially the first performances in Japan of several pieces by James MacMillan and the opera "A Flowering Tree" by John Adams.

Born in 1958 in Tokyo, Otomo graduated from the Toho Gakuen School of Music having studied conducting under Seiji Ozawa, Kazuyoshi Akiyama, Tadaaki Otaka and Morihiro Okabe.



TOMOHARU USHIDA PIANO

Tomoharu Ushida was born in Iwaki City, Fukushima Prefecture, in 1999. Soon after his birth, his family moved to Shanghai. It was there that Tomoharu began his piano studies.

In 2012, Tomoharu won 1st Prize in the 16th Hamamatsu International Piano Academy Competition (becoming the youngest winner in its history). In the same year, he was the youngest-ever Japanese classical pianist to release a debut CD on the Universal Music label. Since then he has released numerous CDs including Tomoharu Ushida Debut (2012), Memories (2012), Liszt & Chopin (2013), Traumerei (2014), Liebesfreud (2015), Pictures at an Exhibition (2016), Chopin 24 Preludes and Ballad No.1 (2019), and in August 2022, he is set to release a new CD CHOPIN RECITAL 2022 as his first live recording. In addition to performing recitals in many locations, Tomoharu Ushida has performed as a soloist on the Japan tours of Wiener Kammer Orchester conducted by Stefan Vladar (2014), Russian National Orchestra led by Mikhail Pletnev (2015 and 2018), Hungarian National Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Ken-ichiro Kobayashi (2016), and The Warsaw Philharmonic led by Jacek Kaspszyk (2018) and Prague Symphony Orchestra conducted by Tomáš Brauner (2024). This season, he is slated to perform with the Warsaw Philharmoic Orchestra on their Japan Tour.



Tokyo Symphony Orchestra (TSO) was founded in 1946 and has a reputation for giving the premiere of a number of contemporary music and opera. And has been regularly performing various operas and ballets at the New National Theatre, Tokyo since its open.

TSO, together with music director Jonathan Nott, has been attracting attention as a leader in the Japanese orchestra world. (Elektra in Concert Style (2023)) won the 1st prize in the "Top 10 Concert 2023". The orchestra also has Keitaro Harada as Permanent Conductor, and Naoto Otomo as Honorary Guest Conductor.

Outside of Japan, the orchestra has performed 79 concerts in 58 cities, including Queen Sirikit's 60th birthday celebrations at Thai Cultural center in 1992.

In 2023 TSO has launched new activities "Asia Project" with funding from the JAPAN ARTS COUNCIL with performance in Bangkok. It will explore diverse values and cultures, promote cultural and human exchange through music, and progress the music culture of Asia as whole.

CHOPIN: PIANO CONCERTO NO.1 IN E MINOR, OP.11

Polish-born Fryderyk Chopin (1810-1849) was first and foremost a composer of piano solo music: sonatas, ballades, polonaises, mazurkas, and nocturnes. On the other hand, his works for piano and orchestra, including the E minor piano concerto we will hear today, were composed when he was still a youth in Warsaw, having just graduated from the music conservatory. At the time he was an ambitious pianist, and one can well imagine from these works that he must have been a fine virtuoso. Of the two concertos, the one in F minor (op. 21) was composed first, but the E minor concerto became No. 1 because it was published first as op.11. Chopin began composing the E minor concerto shortly after the premiere of his F minor concerto in March 1830. We know from a letter Chopin wrote to a friend that by May 1830, he had completed the first two movements, although the Rondo finale was still incomplete.

Chopin modelled his work on the virtuoso concertos of celebrated pianist-composers such as Hummel and Moscheles, written to display their technical abilities to the full. As a result, however, the role of the orchestra remains rather subservient.

The first movement (Allegro maestoso) opens with a dignified orchestral introduction where the two main themes appear. When the solo piano enters, it elaborates the two themes with embellishments and flourishes that are reminiscent of operatic arias of Bellini, a composer Chopin adored. Chopin himself explained that the slow second movement is a "romance in a sentimental vein, tranquil and melancholic" and "it resembles beautiful springtime reflections... by moonlight." The finale, a lively rondo, is based on a traditional Polish dance "krakowiak" which is characterized by syncopated rhythms in fast 2/4 time.

The Concerto in E minor was premiered in public on October 11, 1830, at the National Theatre in Warsaw with Chopin himself at the piano. The concert was a great success, but it became the last public appearance for Chopin in his native country. When he departed for Vienna in November, he took the concerto with him and he performed it at the capital's Kärntnerthor Theater and in Paris the following year, which helped establish his reputation in Europe.

MUSSORGSKY/RAVEL ARR.: PICTURES AT AN EXHIBITION

Pictures at an Exhibition was originally a work for solo piano composed by the nineteenth-century Russian composer, Modest Mussorgsky (1839-1881). It was later orchestrated by Maurice Ravel (1875-1937), at the request of the Russian-born conductor Serge Koussevitsky. Ravel was a renowned master in orchestration, and the work is perhaps more familiar in the orchestral version than the original piano suite.

Mussorgsky was a member of the so-called "Mighty Handful", a group of five Russian composers whose aim was to create a distinctly Russian school of music. He was largely self-taught in composition, developing his own distinct style. His piano suite *Pictures at an Exhibition* was composed in 1874, around the same time as his opera *Boris Godunov*. He had gone to see the memorial exhibition of his friend Viktor Hartmann, a painter and architect who had died suddenly the previous year, and inspired by the paintings on show, he composed this masterpiece in three weeks. Mussorgsky depicts his impressions of Hartmann's paintings with plenty of character and exotic colors.

The work opens with "Promenade", which alternates between 5/4 time and 6/4 time. Led by the fanfare-like solo trumpet tune, the music depicts the composer visiting the exhibition, wandering from one picture to the next. The theme appears five times, much varied each time, forming the links between the pieces. "Gnomus" begins with a weird and grotesque theme in the lower register played by clarinets, bassoons, cellos and basses in unison. "Il vecchio castello" (The Old Castle) depicts a nostalgic song of a troubadour which Ravel allocated to the alto saxophone, which was not a standard orchestral instrument. "Tuileries" captures children running around and quarreling in a garden in Central Paris. "Bydło" ("cattle" in Polish), featuring a solo for a tuba, is said to be a song of the laborers pulling an oxen cart. "Ballet of the Unhatched Chickens", a work for which Hartmann had provided the costume designs, is a light-hearted and humorous dance. "Samuel Goldberg and Schmuyle" paints a cynical view of the dialogue between two Jews, one rich and the other poor.

Two contrasting pieces, "Limoges Marketplace" and "Catacombs" are played without a break, and are followed by the violent music of "Baba-Yaga", a witch that appears in Russian folklore. The magnificent final piece, "The Great Gate of Kiev (Kyiv)" was inspired by Hartmann's imaginative design for the city gate (which was never realized). It quotes an Orthodox hymn in the middle section and ends gloriously with the sound of bells ringing from the cathedral towers. (Nahoko Goto)
